Certificate in Loss, Grief and Bereavement Studies

Grief is a universal event; eventually everyone experiences a significant loss.

An innovative Certificate program offering professionals and lay persons an opportunity to explore cultural, social, and personal aspects of loss, death, dying, and grief; to gain knowledge and experience in providing support for those who experience significant losses, individuals who are terminally ill, and those who experience grief, and to examine relevant legal, ethical, and social issues. The program emphasizes an interdisciplinary approach to the exploration of loss and grief, with an emphasis on effective support and collaboration with community-based services. Many of the courses in this program will be offered online or in mixed-methods teaching models. The Certificate in Loss, Grief, and Bereavement Studies replaces the former Certificate in Grief and Bereavement Studies offered through Western's Centre for Continuing Studies.

Academic standing is retained for the degree-credit courses completed in a certificate program. Students currently enrolled in an undergraduate program (at King's or Western), may pursue the Certificate concurrently with a Bachelor of Arts degree. Courses for the Certificate taken concurrently with a Thanatology module may count for both.

Admission Requirements for current King's/Western students:

Enrolment in the Certificate program requires students currently registered in an undergraduate program at King's or Western, to have a cumulative average of 65%.

King's/Western students, currently enrolled in a degree program, can add the Certificate when they do their Intent to Register (ITR) on-line.

King's/Western Students who are unable to complete an Intent to Register on-line, should see an Academic Counsellor at King's, and complete a paper Intent to Register, or a Change of Status.

Certificate in Loss, Grief and Bereavement Studies

Program Requirements:

Students must achieve an overall average of 65% in the following:

5.0 courses:

2.5 courses: Thanatology 1025A/B, 2225A/B, 2230A/B, 2231A/B, 3360A/B.

2.0 courses from the following: Thanatology 2602A/B, 2605A/B, 3601A/B, 3603A/B, 3606A/B, 3607A/B.

0.5 course from the following: Thanatology 2232A/B, 2233A/B, 2234A/B, 2235A/B, 3320A/B, 3321A/B, 3322A/B, 3323A/B, 3355A/B, Sociology 2245.

NOTE: Effective September 2016, the Certificate must be completed within 5 years.
