## ECONOMICS – MODULE CHECKLIST

### Course Substitutions:

Students registered in modules that require 2200-level Economics courses may NOT take the 2100-level versions of these courses and count them toward their modules. If you are registered in a Major or HSP module, and intend to go to summer school, you must plan to take non-Economics courses.

Students who have completed the appropriate 2100-level Economics courses **before** admission to a Major or HSP with a minimum grade of 70% in each, and a minimum average for those courses of 75%, may be admitted to the Honors Specialization or Major modules if they meet the first-year admission requirements for the HSP and Major modules.

**NOTE for all Economics Modules:**

Students are responsible for the accuracy and completeness of their program.

**Prerequisites and Antirequisites** – Prior to course enrollment students are responsible for checking courses for antirequisites.

**Math Prerequisite Requirements:**

Students who have not completed high school calculus (e.g. MCV4U) will need to take mathematics 0110A/B as a prerequisite to mathematics 1230A/B, calculus 1000A/B.

If a student is required to take **Mathematics 0110A/B** IN ADDITION TO the 1.0 required first-year Mathematics courses listed above it will count toward the 20.0 required courses for the student's degree at King's University College as needed. Mathematics 0110A/B is NOT a substitute for the other 1.0 required first-year Mathematics courses.

**Statistical Sciences 1024A/B cannot** be taken concurrently with any Introductory Statistics course. For a full list of Introductory Statistics courses please check the [details](#).

(Stats 1024A/B **cannot** be taken concurrently or after Econ 2122A/B, Econ 2222A/B, and Stats 2035)

Economics 2123B normally required Economics 2122A as a prerequisite, and Economics 2223B normally required Economics 2222A as a prerequisite. However, starting September 2020, students with a minimum grade of 70% in Statistics 2035 may enroll directly in Econ 2123A/B or 2223A/B. See [details](#).

(This revision doesn't apply to HSP and Major modules as they require a minimum grade of 75% on Stats 2035 to be counted towards the module).
