

Innovative King's Program Fills Critical Mental Health Gap for Local Families

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London, ON - More than 200 families in the London community accessed free mental health support last year through King's University College's <u>Support and Aid to Families Electronically (SAFE) program</u>. Since its launch in 2021, the program has helped hundreds of parents and caregivers navigate mental health challenges, filling a critical gap in accessible services.

SAFE delivers free, online support tailored to families, addressing barriers like cost, location, and long wait times. The program's growing usage highlights its vital role in meeting a pressing community need, with 219 families benefiting from SAFE's services in its third year alone.

The program also engages King's students as service providers and researchers, offering them invaluable hands-on experience while contributing to community-driven care. This approach reflects King's commitment to combining academic excellence with meaningful social impact.

The SAFE research team's work recently gained national recognition, earning the 2024 Best Qualitative Article Award from *Families in Society*, a highly regarded research journal on social work practice. The award-winning research advocates for systemic shifts in mental health care delivery, focusing on family involvement as a cornerstone of effective support.
