- Extra credit assignments are not available; tests and exams cannot be rewritten.
- Re-weighting to the final exam is not available in this course beyond what has already been described in this course outline.

- This course is run in conjunction with main campus, which means some assessments will be partially or wholly in common for thousands of students in many course sections.

Missed Work Policy

- **Online quizzes:**
 - There are no makeup quizzes for missed online quizzes. From the six available quizzes, your lowest quiz grade will be dropped, which thus allows you to miss one online quiz without any penalty.
 - Quizzes cannot be completed late – they are strictly due at the indicated deadlines.
- **In-person quizzes:**
 - There are no makeup quizzes for missed in-person quizzes. Without academic consideration or self-reported absence, a grade of 0 will apply. With academic consideration or self-reported absence, the following policy will apply:
 - If you miss quiz A, the 5% weight will apply to test 1
 - If you miss quiz B, the 5% weight will apply to test 2
 - If you miss quiz C, the 5% weight will apply to the final exam
- **Test 1:**
 - If you miss test 1 (with academic consideration or self-reported absence), there will be a makeup test on Friday, October 31 from 2:30 – 4:30 PM.
 - If you then miss the makeup for test 1 (with academic consideration), the weight of test 1 will shift to the final exam.
 - Without academic consideration for missing the makeup test, your test 1 grade will be 0.
- **Test 2:**
 - If you miss test 2 (academic consideration is required; test 2 is NOT ELIGIBLE for self-reported absence), there will be a makeup test on Friday, November 21 from 2:30 – 4:30 PM.
 - If you then miss the makeup for test 2 (with academic consideration), the weight of test 2 will shift to the final exam.
 - Without academic consideration for missing the makeup, your test 2 grade will be 0.
- **Final exam:**
 - If you miss the final exam with academic consideration, a makeup exam will be scheduled for you.
 - Without academic consideration, the missed exam grade is 0.
- **Online makeups are NOT available for any reason.**

1. Academic Accommodations, Consideration for Absences

Academic Accommodation (Accessibility)

Accessibility Services works to ensure that academic programs are accessible to all students, and supports students who may have a condition related to, but not limited to, vision, hearing, mobility, different ways of learning, mental health, chronic illnesses, chronic pain, autism spectrum disorder, ADD/ADHD, and temporary conditions (beyond short-term academic consideration). Academic Consideration for Student Absence

If a student is unable to meet a course requirement due to substantial but temporary extenuating circumstances (medical or compassionate), they should follow the procedures below.

In some cases, where instructors have built flexibility into their assessments, this flexibility will already address consideration needs.

Requests for academic consideration should be directed to the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration. Requests must be made as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours after the missed assessment.

As a rule, documentation is required for academic consideration. For academic consideration requests on medical grounds, the Student Medical Certificate is available at https://www.kings.uwo.ca/kings/assets/File/currentStudents/courses_enrollment/exams_and_tests/SMC-Feb-2025.pdf.

Students are permitted one academic consideration request without supporting documentation per term per course.

Instructors may designate one assessment per half-course weight as requiring formal supporting documentation. Please refer to the course outline for each course.

Absences from Final Examinations

If you miss the Final Exam, contact the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a “Multiple Exam Situation” (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. Religious Accommodation
