Course Description

An introduction to econometric description and inference which covers descriptive statistics for cross-section and time-series samples; probability, discrete and continuous probability distributions, random variables; estimators and sampling distributions; confidence intervals and tests of hypotheses; simple linear regression for normal and non-normal populations.

Learning Outcomes

The learning outcomes for this course include: At the end of this course students should be able to: (i) interpret tables, graphs, and statistics used for describing data; (ii) apply probability theory to model random variables; (iii) estimate population parameters using point and interval estimators; (iv) evaluate and describe the properties of an estimator; and (v) test theories about population parameters (determine an appropriate test statistic; implement a formal hypothesis test and interpret the outcomes)

Students are required to attend all the lectures and labs. The teaching material and announcements will be updated weekly on OWL. It is your responsibility to check them regularly.

***IMPORTANT NOTE:** Students get min. 40 in the final exam to pass this course.

Students who miss the midterm test must obtain academic accommodation to have the weight transferred to the final exam and they need to pass the final exam in order to pass this course. For students who get min 40 in the final exam, the final exam weight may be up to 50% if their final exam is higher than the midterm. However, the final exam weight cannot be transferred to the midterm in the event you do not get the min. 40 in the final exam, the maximum grade in this course will be 49% and you will not receive course credit.
