### Course Description

The modern global economy is a social system of unparalleled complexity. Microeconomics peers into this complex system to discover a hidden order. In this course we will carefully develop economic theories of the consumer and the firm and examine the equilibrium of competitive markets. Using these fundamental theories, we will discover how local, regional, and global markets create and organize extraordinarily complex, decentralized, responsive, and deeply interlinked social systems of human cooperation.

All lectures and tests will be delivered in person. **Class attendance is mandatory.**

### **In Class Quizzes:** (20% of your final grade)

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There will be 8 to 10 in class quizzes distributed in class. The completed quiz will be handed at the end of class. You must attend class to receive the quiz and to submit your completed quiz. The lowest 2 quiz grades, including missed quizzes, will be dropped from consideration when calculating your final grade for quizzes. As such, requests for academic consideration for these in class quizzes will be denied.

### **Midterm Exam:** (30% of your final grade)

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The midterm will be held in class during scheduled class time at a time to be announced. The test will cover all material from the lectures and readings (probably Chapters 1- 5). Please email me before the exam starts if you are sick and cannot take the exam.

### **Final Exam:** (50% of your final grade)

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**Final Exam: time, day, and location TBA.** The final exam will cover all material from lectures and readings for the entire semester. The duration of the exam will be 3 hours and it will be scheduled during the April exam period. I will post the exam date on OWL Brightspace when Western announces the date. Do not make travel plans during the Final Exam Period (April 12<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup>) until the exam dates are finalized.

##### **Academic Consideration for Student Absence**

If a student is unable to meet a course requirement due to substantial but temporary extenuating circumstances (medical or compassionate), they should follow the procedures below.

##### **Absences from Final Examinations**

If you miss the Final Exam, contact the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a “Multiple Exam Situation” (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

### **5. Copyright of Course Material**

Faculty members are the exclusive owner of copyright in those materials they create. Students may take notes and make copies for their own use.
