Calendar Description: This course enables students to master literary reading, including understanding major aspects of French and Francophone literatures and cultures, their particular histories as well as their relationship to the larger discipline of arts and humanities. The course provides tools for textual analysis, and improves written and oral communication in French.

Prerequisite(s): French 1900E or French 1910 or permission of the French Program Coordinator.

Anti-requisite(s): French 2600E.

Extra Information: 3 lecture/tutorial hours. Note at Huron, King's campus: French 2605F/G and French 2606F/G or French 2600E are prerequisites for further studies in French literature.

Course description: This course enables students to master literary reading, including the understanding of major aspects of French and Francophone literatures and cultures and their relationship to the larger discipline of arts and humanities.

Course learning outcomes: Students will acquire a comprehensive knowledge of the major literary, philosophical, and theoretical texts and issues from this period and their relation to the culture in which they were produced.

Students are permitted one academic consideration request without supporting documentation per term per course.

Absences from Final Examinations

If you miss the Final Exam, contact the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a “Multiple Exam Situation” (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. Please note that Friday Make-Up Exams may only be written with the instructor’s consent.

Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

5. Copyright of Course Material

Lectures and course materials, including PowerPoint presentations, tests, outlines, and similar materials are protected by copyright. Faculty members are the exclusive owner of copyright in those materials they create. Students may take notes and make copies for their own use. Students may not allow others to reproduce or distribute lecture notes and course materials publicly (whether or not a fee is charged) without the express written consent of a faculty member. Unauthorized sharing of class content is subject to academic discipline.

Similarly, students own copyright in their own original papers and exam essays. If a faculty member wishes to post a student's answers or papers on the course website, they should ask for the student's written permission.

Any student who, in the opinion of the instructor, is absent too frequently from class or laboratory periods in any course, will be reported to the Dean of the Faculty offering the course, after due warning has been given.
