**Course Description:**

ᑕᐱᐃᐅ tawâw (welcome)! My name is Jess and I am a Two Spirit nehiyaw/Métis/settler prof here at King's. My Elders are nehiyaw, Anishinaabe, and Haudenosaunee, so the Teachings I carry are from different Nations. I love teaching and learning, and can't wait to sit in Circle and share our truth and wisdom together in class!!

"Decolonizing Social Science" visibilizes universities, including the social sciences, as sites of colonization and seeks to disrupt and act against this violence through Indigenous ways of knowing and being, decoloniality and pluriversality (not universality). We will learn with Elders, land defenders, activists, and scholars whose lived knowledges/praxis are created in embodied struggles for freedom. We do this through a process of "Knowing Our Gifts and Giving Them to the World" (see the Course Schedule below for further details).

To decolonize is to care, (un)learn, and take action within relationships of respect and reciprocity. This semester, we will explore our gifts and the relationships within which they have arisen; learn about Knowledge Carriers (human and More-than-Human), scholars and activists whose knowledges/praxis have been co-opted by, marginalized within or excluded from "social science"; learn to tell relational stories about ourselves and additional knowers; and use our learning to co-create a gift to offer the university and wider community.

This is *your* education; *your* learning space. Being student-centred means ensuring space for students to choose learning priorities. There is space in our collective learning journey to reflect and shift together. Can't wait to meet you!!!! ᑕᐱᐃᐅ ka-wapahmitinâwâw (see you)! 🤔 🤔

**Course Learning Outcomes:**

- Explain relationality, responsibility and reciprocity as pathways to toward decolonizing ourselves, our learning journeys, and social science more broadly (including epistemology, ontology, and "the social")
- Begin to decolonize ourselves and our relationships through ᑕᐱᐃᐅ wâhkôhtowin (recognizing and respecting our relatedness to all beings, human and More-than-Human)
- Enact collective care by offering and giving our gifts to the class, university and wider communities

**Mode of Instruction:** In person, experiential learning (there is no cost to participate in any course activities)

**Course Textbooks/Materials:**

A course schedule with a list of materials will be provided on Brightspace – and all learning materials will be provided (at no cost) or are in the library. These may include readings, videos, podcasts, social media links, etc.

**Academic Integrity / Remote Proctoring:**

#### **1. Academic Accommodations, Consideration for Absences**

##### **Academic Accommodation (Accessibility)**

Accessibility Services works to ensure that academic programs are accessible to all students, and supports students who may have a condition related to, but not limited to, vision, hearing, mobility, different ways of learning, mental health, chronic illnesses, chronic pain, autism spectrum disorder, ADD/ADHD, and temporary conditions (beyond short-term academic consideration). ##### **Academic Consideration for Student Absence**

If a student is unable to meet a course requirement due to substantial but temporary extenuating circumstances (medical or compassionate), they should follow the procedures below.

In some cases, where instructors have built flexibility into their assessments, this flexibility will already address consideration needs.

Requests for academic consideration should be directed to the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration. Requests must be made as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours after the missed assessment.

As a rule, documentation is required for academic consideration. Students are permitted one academic consideration request without supporting documentation per term per course.

Instructors may designate one assessment per half-course weight as requiring formal supporting documentation. Please refer to the course outline for each course.

##### **Absences from Final Examinations**

If you miss the Final Exam, contact the Academic Advising Office of your faculty/college of registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a “Multiple Exam Situation” (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. ## **Religious Accommodation**

Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

### **5. Copyright of Course Material**

Lectures and course materials, including PowerPoint presentations, tests, outlines, and similar materials are protected by copyright. Faculty members are the exclusive owner of copyright in those materials they create. Students may take notes and make copies for their own use. Students may not allow others to reproduce or distribute lecture notes and course materials publicly (whether or not a fee is charged) without the express written consent of a faculty member. Unauthorized sharing of class content is subject to academic discipline.

Similarly, students own copyright in their own original papers and exam essays. If a faculty member wishes to post a student's answers or papers on the course website, they should ask for the student's written permission.

### **6. Use of Recordings**

Participants in this course are not permitted to record the sessions, except where recording is an approved accommodation and/or the participant has the prior written permission of the instructor. Unauthorized recording and/or sharing of class content is subject to academic discipline.

### **7. Policy on Attendance**

Any student who, in the opinion of the instructor, is absent too frequently from class or laboratory periods in any course, will be reported to the Dean of the Faculty offering the course, after due warning has been given. On the recommendation of the department concerned, and with the permission of the Dean of that Faculty, the student will be debarred from taking the regular examination in the course.
