**GSWS 1020E 670 – Introduction to Gender, Sexuality, & Women's Studies**

**Course Description**

This is an online course that serves as an introductory, interdisciplinary, and intersectional survey of gender and sexuality roles in our own society and around the globe. Together we will examine how gender differences (specifically in the constructions of femininity and masculinity) are established through various institutional practices and power structures. Through these examinations, we strive to make connections between our own lives, changing global dynamics, and the existences of international movements fighting for women's and other gender equity-seeking groups. This course includes a herstory of feminism(s), where we explore central ideas and figures of a variety of movements, critically assess those frameworks, as well as challenge common misconceptions of what feminism is.

Over the academic year together, we will explore, among other issues, the following: gender stratification; femininity, sexuality, and the female body (particularly in relation to sexual identity, reproduction, eating disorders, and perceptions of beauty); masculinities; men in feminism; indigenous feminism; intersexuality and transgender; women and labour; intersections of race, class, sexual orientation, and (dis)ability with our gendered experience in the world; global feminism; and activism for gender equality/equity/freedom across classes, nations, and ethnicities.

**Learning Objectives**

This course will enable students to:

- gain a perspective on women's movement history, and the issues facing female-identifying folks today, both locally and globally;
- understand how female-identifying folks are represented in disciplines such as sport, literature, science, and in popular culture and media, and how that impacts everyone;
- consider how gender operates as a site of social and political control over both men and women, and non-binary, trans and other gender minorities;
- identify key theoretical debates, differences and similarities in feminist thought;
- recognize how the social construction of gender is related to sexuality, race, ethnicity, class, (dis)ability and age.

In addition, the course will assist students in developing aptitude in:

- analytical/critical thinking;
- oral and written communication skills; and
- research

**1. Academic Accommodations, Consideration for Absences**

**Academic Accommodation (Accessibility)**
