Course Description & Particulars

Let's philosophically examine the inked life! Tattooing as body art and storytelling, both historically and contemporaneously, is at its core language – in this case, a plethora of diverse *languages*. Each unique group that is part of tattoo culture has its own way of and reasons for communicating the messages it does, its own symbols and meanings and rituals. Tattooing as a language is a body philosophy, one that engages semiotics, hermeneutics, existentialism, metaphysics, phenomenology, epistemology, and postmodernism.

In this course we will bring a variety of philosophical figures into conversations with tattoo art, culture, and practice. Topics include power, sexuality, identity, gender, lived body, hermeneutics, semiotics, epistemology and existentialism. We will engage with thinkers such as Foucault, Beauvoir, Merleau-Ponty, Gadamer, Kant, Camus, Sartre, Loder, Frege, and Bauman, and discuss readings that span philosophy, pop culture, history, and anthropology. What becomes clear is not only how tattooing is a body/flesh philosophy, an aesthetic and powerful one, but in its very essence it is interdisciplinary, intersectional humanities.

Diversity, inclusion, equity and decolonization are core principles of this course and its design. Our materials are inclusive of 2SLGBTQIA+ folk and BIPOC, and we can be immersed in social justice issues related to colonization, imperialism, capitalism, sexism, racism, classism, ableism, homophobia, transphobia, and HIV/AIDS. Trigger warnings will be issued when it feels necessary, but it is good to understand the potential for any lecture to involve sensitive material.

Learning Objectives & Outcomes

This course will enable students to possess:

- A better understanding of the rich nature of tattoo culture and aesthetics, and how these are saturated in philosophical discourse;
- A fresh perspective on how tattooing as an ancient humanities is art, communication, and language;

- A clear picture of the role of power and privilege that is bound up in tattoo art and culture;
- Develop a critical set of lenses and strategies for adapting philosophical treatises and ideas to tattoo culture;
- Explore the intersections of gender, race, sexuality, identity, and social privilege with the discourses on tattooing; and
- Engage with multiple theoretical practices and interdisciplinary approaches to deeply understand the history of tattooing and its modern practices.

In addition, this course will assist students in developing aptitude in:

- Analytical, critical, and creative thinking;
- Critical reading
- Application skills;
- Oral and written skills; and
- Interdisciplinary research.

Student Evaluation

1. Reflection Assignment (Due Jan. 29)	20%
2. Oral Presentation (various due dates)	20%
3. Essay Project (Thesis/Outline 10% + paper 30%) (Due Feb. 26, April 9)	40%
4. Participation/Engagement	10%

Please note, you must complete the reflection and the essay project, and have participation that is 65% or better in order to receive a passing grade.

All written assignments come with a grace period of 12 hours where no late penalty will be applied, and permission to submit on a later date can be arranged with sufficient notice ahead of the deadline. If arrangements are not made, a late penalty of 5% is applied and after 7 days the mark is 0.

Participation/Engagement

This course, by design, is meant to be a group discussion as much as lecture. While there will be moments of lecture, the hope is to have lots of conversations with each other every class as we apply theory and talk about tattoo philosophy. Engagement in this course is thoughtful participation in the weekly class discussions we have together.

Readings

You do not need to buy a textbook for this course. All required readings and media will be available in BrightSpace in the Course Readings tab which links to the library. If there is anything the library cannot get, I will supply it. Approximate reading demand for this course is about 30 – 40 pages per week, which includes academic and non-academic pieces, and sometimes media to watch/listen to. It will be clearly marked on the syllabus when a film will be viewed in class, in which case you do not need to watch it before class.

(ii) Academic consideration through an undocumented absence
