COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction to the rich and varied religions of the world, past and present, set within their historical and cultural contexts. In the First Term, we delve into Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Daoism, and Shinto; in the Second Term, we examine Judaism, Christianity and Islam.

COURSE FORMAT

This is an in-person course, which meets twice a week throughout both terms.

Students are responsible for ensuring that their selection of courses is appropriate and accurately recorded, that all course prerequisites have been successfully completed, and that they are aware of any antirequisite course(s) that they have taken. COURSE OBJECTIVES AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

This course is designed to provide students with a basic introduction to the major religious traditions of the East (Term I) and West (Term II). No prior experience in the study of World Religions is required or assumed. In the first term, we will begin with a brief discussion of Religious Studies as an academic discipline and a brief introduction to Shamanism/Animism, after which we will survey a variety of religious traditions from India (Hinduism and Buddhism), China (Confucianism and Daoism), and Japan (Shinto). The second term is primarily devoted to an examination of Judaism, Christianity and Islam.

Over the course of the year, we will be emphasizing a number of general points. These include: the ambiguous nature of the term 'religion' and the difficulty in arriving at a clear definition of the phenomenon; the fact that religions change over time and thus have histories; the fact that religions often mutually influence one another; the fact that a number of similarities can be found across various religious traditions; and the fact that the relative emphases placed on religious beliefs vs. religious behaviors varies widely from one tradition to the next.

The **Learning Outcomes** for this course include a student's ability to:

- (1) briefly sketch out the history of each religious tradition covered;
- (2) clearly articulate the primary doctrines and practices of each tradition;
- (3) demonstrate an understanding of basic similarities among religions as well as differences;
- (4) appreciate and articulate the complexity of the study of religion and the wide variety of methods used in the field of Religious Studies;
- (5) appreciate and articulate an understanding of the often-intimate relationship between religious ideas and cultural worldviews/politics; and
- (6) write, on both writing assignments/essays and exams, in a clear, concise and persuasive manner.

All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com.

LATE ASSIGNMENT POLICY

'Late' penalties for written assignments will be 5% per day.

1. Academic Accommodations (Accessibility)

2. Academic Consideration for Student Absences

Students must be approved to write a makeup exam or for an extension of the assignment deadline. If you need to miss an exam or the deadline for the assignment, please follow these instructions.

There are two ways to seek academic consideration:

(i) Academic consideration based on medical or compassionate grounds

If a student is unable to meet a course requirement due to substantial but temporary extenuating circumstances (medical or compassionate grounds), they should contact the Academic Advising Office. As a rule, documentation is required for academic consideration.

(ii) Academic consideration through an undocumented absence

Students are permitted one academic consideration request without supporting documentation per term per half-course (0.5) weight.

- Note that instructors may designate one assessment per half-course weight as requiring supporting documentation. Please refer to the course outline to confirm this which assessment has been designated as requiring documentation for consideration (that is, exempt from undocumented absences).
- Undocumented absences can not be used as the basis for academic consideration for December or April exams.

If an instructor has built flexibility into their assessments (e.g., “complete 8 of 10 quizzes”), this flexibility will already address consideration needs and thus academic consideration may be denied.

c) Absences from Final Exams

If you miss the Final Exam, **contact your Academic Advising Office** as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the “Special Examination” (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a multiple exam situation (i.e., you are scheduled to write more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred. d) Religious Accommodations
