Course Description

By exploring the religious foundations of justice and peace in Islam, this course examines Muslims' conceptualizations and the (successful or failed) expressions of justice and peace in historical and modern contexts. We will begin with exploring the conceptualization of justice and peace on doctrinal and institutional levels as they are expressed in the Quran and the example of the Prophet Muhammad's life (Sunnah). We will pay special attention to the social and communal implications of the Five Pillars of Islam as well as the concepts of *Ummah* (Community) and *dhimmis* (protected religious minorities) as the principles that encourage Muslims to work for just communities. We will also explore the importance of justice and peace in Sufism, law and theology. Historical examples of attempting to establish justice will be considered (in Andalus and India for example), but of particular interest will be the contemporary issues of social, gender, racial, and environmental justice as they are textually defined and socially enacted. Some of the questions we will attempt to answer include: How do we account for violence perpetrated by Muslims? What are the complex causes of the erosion of peace in contemporary Muslim societies? What concrete strategies and practices are adopted by Muslims in pursuit of a more just and humane world? What can Muslims learn from other activists and what can Islam and Muslims contribute to the promotion of justice and peace?

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of the course, students will have acquired:

1. Substantial knowledge of Islam's conceptions of justice and peace as envisioned in its primary sources
2. An appreciation of the complexities of the challenges and opportunities for implementing justice and peace in historical and modern contexts
3. The ability to apply relevant methodologies to the analysis of concrete communal issues of justice and peace

Mode of Instruction:

Method of Evaluation:

- 10% Attendance, Active and Informed Participation
- 10% 5 reading/class responses, 250 words, 2% each, due the day after each class. See instructions below.*

- 25% Final exam (scheduled by the University)

Your response will be full sentence (not point form) reflecting your thoughts to the questions I post about each class. I will explain this and we will discuss possible answers to each question before you write them in each class. 250 words each, but its ok if you go over the word limit, but no more than 300-350 please. **UPLOAD THESE AS PDF ONLY, makes it easier for me to open. Thank you!**

- Your responses will be marked out of 100 and are worth 2% each of your final grade (5 x 2 = 10% total), so the quality of your writing and on-time submission impacts the mark you get for these exercises.
- Deadline: the end of the day after each class, so the first one, for example, will be due at the end of Sept. 9, 2025.

1. Academic Accommodations (Accessibility)

2. Academic Consideration for Student Absences

Students must be approved to write a makeup exam or for an extension of the assignment deadline. If you need to miss an exam or the deadline for the assignment, please follow these instructions.

There are two ways to seek academic consideration:

(i) Academic consideration based on medical or compassionate grounds

If a student is unable to meet a course requirement due to substantial but temporary extenuating circumstances (medical or compassionate grounds), they should contact the Academic Advising Office. As a rule, documentation is required for academic consideration.

- If your home faculty is Huron or at Western, please submit your documentation to your faculty's academic counselling office.
- Requests must be made as soon as possible, and no later than 48 hours after the missed assessment.

(ii) Academic consideration through an undocumented absence

Students are permitted one academic consideration request without supporting documentation per term per half-course (0.5) weight.

- Note that instructors may designate one assessment per half-course weight as requiring supporting documentation. Please refer to the course outline to confirm this which assessment has been designated as requiring documentation for consideration (that is, exempt from undocumented absences).
- Undocumented absences can not be used as the basis for academic consideration for December or April exams.

If an instructor has built flexibility into their assessments (e.g., “complete 8 of 10 quizzes”), this flexibility will already address consideration needs and thus academic consideration may be denied.

c) Absences from Final Exams

If you miss the Final Exam, **contact your Academic Advising Office** as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the “Special Examination” (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a multiple exam situation (i.e., you are scheduled to write more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, or more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

If a student fails to write a scheduled Special Examination, the date of the next Special Examination (if granted) normally will be the scheduled date for the final exam the next time this course is offered. The maximum course load for that term will be reduced by the credit of the course(s) for which the final examination has been deferred.
